The representation of gender in mainstream Hindi cinema has been a subject of ongoing scrutiny, in particular, the way it tends to support gender stereotypes and male chauvinism. As one of India's most influential cultural mediums, Bollywood holds considerable power in shaping societal norms and values through its narratives. Despite the industry's evolution over time,

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certain entrenched ideologies exist, subtly reinforcing notions of gender superiority and traditional roles. The industry continues to prioritize male-centric narratives and perpetuate patriarchal ideologies, thereby reinforcing existing power structures and marginalizing women both on and off-screen.

Since its beginning, Hindi cinema has undergone significant transformations in its portrayal of women, although underlying sexism remains prevalent. Initially characterized by overt misogyny, in older movies, female characters typically played roles such as mothers, romantic interests, or wives of the male protagonists, mostly as supporting characters to the lead. These women were often portrayed as providing moments of respite amidst the challenges faced by the heroes. Those who deviated from societal norms were typically depicted as mistresses or club dancers, often associated with habits like smoking or drinking or expressing overt sexuality. Costume choices further reinforced these distinctions, with 'good' women dressed in traditional attire, while 'not-so-good' women were depicted in more revealing clothing. Women in Bollywood are often depicted according to archetypal gender roles, with 'good' women portrayed as domestic, virtuous, and submissive, while 'unacceptable and villainous' characters challenge societal norms and face condemnation. These representations not only reinforce gender stereotypes but also perpetuate a culture of objectification and victim-blaming. (Banerjee, July 8, 2021)

Hindi cinema has witnessed a shift towards more nuanced portrayals of gender, though underlying biases remained constant. In contrast, efforts have been made to introduce more 'realistic' female characters in films like Jab We Met (2007), Kahaani (2012), Barfi (2012), Queen (2013), Piku (2015), Hichki (2018), Mardaani (2019), Gangubaai (2022), etc. Films like this have portrayed strong characters. In many films where female characters are portrayed as independent or empowered, they are often subjected to objectification or victimization, serving to highlight the supposed superiority of male characters. Still today, mainstream blockbusters like "Kabir Singh" and "Animal" have sparked debates about the portrayal of gender dynamics in Bollywood, highlighting both progress and areas for improvement.

One of the recurring tropes in Hindi cinema is the glorification of masculinity, wherein male characters exhibit traits such as dominance, aggression, and machismo, which are celebrated as symbols of strength and authority. This portrayal not only reinforces gender stereotypes but also contributes to the normalization of male chauvinism, where women are expected to conform to subservient roles and defer to the authority of men.

In the realm of Hindi cinema, the objectification of women is an unfortunately common occurrence, often reducing them to mere objects for the male gaze. This trend is evident in numerous questionable films where female bodies are exploited for entertainment purposes. Whether through provocative item songs or sexist dialogues, many Hindi films perpetuate the objectification of women, relegating them to secondary roles and reinforcing harmful stereotypes. This prevalent use of female-centric objectification in Hindi cinema not only reflects broader societal attitudes but also perpetuates gender inequality and shows the superiority of male chauvinism in the industry.

The portrayal of male dominance and patriarchy in Hindi cinema has persisted over decades, influencing societal perceptions and reinforcing gender stereotypes. Despite some progress, Indian films continue to reflect a patriarchal society where men hold primary power and dominate various aspects of life. 
