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Visualizing Gender Disparities: Analyzing Academic Video Content on YouTube in India

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ABSTRACT

YouTube has emerged as a promising platform for education, especially during the pandemic. Being a new and interactive media, it is expected that the content in these educational videos on YouTube will be democratic and free from gender biases. Numerous reports have highlighted the existing gender gaps. According to the World Economic Forum's Gender Gap Index Report, India's ranking (2021) has slipped to 140 out of 156 countries and 112 out of 153 in 2020. This research paper aims to highlight the ground reality of gender discrimination through educational videos that disseminate knowledge to children. COVID-19 has given a massive boost to online education. Despite using the latest technology, these videos promote the same patriarchal values in the minds of young children. In the educational videos selected by the researcher, men are shown as the breadwinners and family heads, whereas women are mostly shown in their traditional roles of caregivers.

INTRODUCTION

Since the inception of the Indian Constitution, men and women have had equal rights. Despite this, women struggle for recognition in society, at home, and in the workplace. The Government of India recognizes this issue and has initiated various programs to achieve gender parity in economic, political, social, and educational areas. Goal 5 of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) emphasizes gender equality, stating that success in other SDG dimensions depends on it (UN Women, 2018).

YouTube, an American video-sharing website, was founded by three former PayPal employees. Initially intended for dating videos, it was relaunched on December 15, 2005, and quickly gained popularity. In 2005, YouTube videos received 2 million views daily, increasing to 25 million the following year. Google acquired YouTube for \$1.65 billion due to its rapid growth. By June 2022, over 500 hours of video were uploaded every minute (Statista). These videos are of different genres such as music, comedy, animation, education, "how-to-tutorials," etc. Brame

(2015) emphasizes that educational video creators should consider the learner's sensory, working, and long-term memory. This approach helps optimize video content to enhance learning and retention. Additionally, the duration of educational videos should be suitable to maintain student engagement (Kosterelioglu, 2016).

OBJECTIVES

- To find out whether the educational videos on YouTube are gender-biased or not.
- To investigate whether the educational videos on YouTube are re-instating the patriarchalnorms in the minds of the kids or not.
- To examine how educational videos on YouTube can be gender-neutral.

Review of Literature

Learning has evolved from traditional methods in ancient Indian "Gurukuls" to modern online and web-based platforms, where audio-visual content is available on

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demand. In Gurukuls, students lived with their teachers, or "Gurus," and were taught subjects like economics, politics, and physical and moral education (Ghonge et al., 2021). Digital technology has revolutionized education, enabling students to access lessons anytime via platforms like YouTube and other learning management systems. Educational videos in high school classes increase student motivation and interest, making learning more interactive and participatory. For instance, showing aviation-related videos to 10th-grade students positively impacted their understanding of aviation English (Secera et al., 2015). However, viewership of educational content on YouTube shows a gender bias, with STEM videos being more popular among males. PBS Digital Studios (2019) reported that their science and technology programs, including "Crash Course," are watched predominantly by males, with 65% male viewership.

Similarly, "It is OK to be Smart" and "Physics Girl" have male audiences of 75% and 80%, respectively (Landrum, 2019). In contrast, Google and Nielsen's 2020 data suggest that over half of YouTube's audience is female. Instructional videos have been shown to help students retain and memorize content (27%), increase interest and understanding (12%), and improve concentration (10%). The most significant benefit 38% of students reported was the "Permanency Effect," indicating a long-term impact of what they learned from the videos. This research involved 153 students (Kosterelioglu, 2016). Despite efforts to achieve gender parity, challenges remain. According to the UNDP's Human Development Report, India ranks 108th out of 193 countries on the Gender Inequality Index, scoring 0.437 (PIB, 2024). Although India's position has improved over the last decade, significant progress is still needed.

Research Methodology

This research examined 50 educational videos in English, Hindi, Punjabi, and Marathi for their impact on school children's mentality. The videos, posted on various YouTube channels by teachers, included simple topics like descriptive essays on 'My Mother" and 'My Family.' Purposive sampling was used to select popular videos based on view counts, and judgment sampling determined the essay topics. Content analysis of the videos was done to measure the occurrence of certain words. Besides that, the qualitative analysis assessed the language, content, subscribers, messages, opinions, narrator's voice, and modulation.

Application of Theories

This research is based on the Social Learning Theory of Gender Development, which asserts that parents, teachers, peers, and media shape gender roles and beliefs. Children observe and imitate the behavior of these role models. For instance, teachers' traditional views can undermine girls' confidence in subjects like Math and Science. Media also perpetuates gender stereotypes, often

depicting men in leadership and women in domestic roles through various platforms like TV, the internet, and social media. Educational videos showing women in domestic tasks reinforce the idea that homemaking is a woman's primary responsibility, influencing children's attitudes into adulthood. Additionally, the Gender Schema Theory by Sandra Bem (1981) suggests that children develop cognitive frameworks for gender roles based on societal observations. This theory indicates that societies assign specific roles to genders, often placing men in higher-status positions and women in caregiving roles, which children learn through social interactions.

Content Analysis of the Videos

Fifty videos of Indian regional language subjects English, Hindi, Punjabi, and Marathi were used. The first 29 videos are from the "English" language. A content analysis of the videos was conducted to conclude. The frequency of words such as women as housewives/homemakers, women as working professionals/working women, and women as caregivers was noted, and that is how data was identified. On 'Learn Essay Speech', which has 1.58K subscribers, a video titled 'My Family' for 4th or 5th graders features a doctor, father, and housewife mother in a family of six. Read by a female voice; the sentences are written clearly with mild background music, maintaining a child-friendly pace and good quality.

'Learn Essay Speech' presents 'My Family' for middle school students. A female voice narrates while writing in a notebook, with clear handwriting and good video quality. The essay depicts a family with a teacher, a father, and a mother who is a housewife.

In the latest "Let's Write" video, the portrayal of a mother as a homemaker is emphasized, showcasing her role in cooking and caring for the family. The "SAZ Education" video is probably for high school students. It does not have someone speaking. The essay starts by talking generally about how important mothers are. Then, it talks about specific qualities.

The "Study Koro" video features a simple "My Mother" essay with ten easy lines aimed at young kids. There is no narration, just clear handwriting, and calming music. Abhi Kumar's "My Mother" video features 20 concise sentences for primary schoolers. "5 Points English" presents an essay on "My Mother"

"Calligraphy Creators," with 326K subscribers, presents an essay on "My Mother" using a dictation method. Each sentence is written before being narrated by a female voice accompanied by soothing music. In the @growskills17 video, the mother is portrayed as a working woman adept at balancing work and life. She cares for the elderly at home and engages in social work, aiding needy people. In The Punjabi Site's video, a 10-sentence essay on "My Mother" is tailored for primary schoolers. The teacher instructs on including personal details. The video quality could be better, but the mother's profession or education needs to be present. The focus remains on her familial duties and care for the children.www.youtube.com/watch?v=AiUqq0n05Ts

In "Urmila Rani Goyal's" video on "My Mother," children are encouraged to personalize their essays by gathering details directly from their mothers, including age and qualifications. The essay depicts a mother who was educated up to the 10th standard and focuses on managing household tasks. www.youtube.com/watch?v=nx2AjUezEyU

"My Punjabi Class" reads a typed essay, urging students to personalize it with their mother's details. Divided into three paragraphs, it highlights mothers as first teachers, emphasizing their homemaker roles in cooking and caring for the family. www.youtube.com/watch?v=xReRIaj1Ak8

From the Punjabi Site, a well-written essay on "My Mother" is tailored for middle school learners and divided into five paragraphs and high school learners into five paragraphs. Although her profession is not specified, she is a homemaker. She rises early, tends to plants, cooks delicious meals, and visits the Gurudwara daily. wwGurudwaraom/watch?v=6XJ-dqkMWEM

In the video from Punjabi Classes by Sunita Kamboj, the teacher narrates an essay from the textbook, encouraging students to personalize it with their mother's name and age. In this simple essay aimed at primary school kids, the mother rises early to complete household chores. www. youtube.com/watch?v=8LWokqioaz0

Devanshi Vridhi presents a simple 10-sentence essay

for primary school kids. It describes how the mother spends her day rising early to manage household chores, caring for the family, and assisting with homework without mentioning her profession or qualifications. www.youtube.com/watch?v=61Ub2P4QikA

In the video from 'All About Learning Gagz Creations' (51.7K subscribers), the mother, a teacher, lovingly cares for the kids, cooks delicious food, assists with studies, and looks after the family.

Data Analysis

The content analysis of 50 educational videos in English, Hindi, Marathi, and Punjabi reveals that despite the language differences, the videos share similar content. As far as English language videos are concerned, women were shown as homemakers in all the selected videos. Similarly, out of 19 videos on 'My Mother,' the homemaker word appeared 17 times. As far as Hindi Language Videos are concerned, out of 8 of the videos of 'My Mother,' the frequency of the word homemaker/housewife is 7. Women were shown as homemakers in all six Marathi language videos on the same topic. In Punjabi language videos, the frequency of the word mothers as homemakers/housewives is 6 out of 7 videos. Out of 50 videos, 46 have shown women as homemakers taking care of domestic work such as cooking and child-rearing (Table 1).

CONCLUSION AND FUTURE WORK

This analysis highlights the prevalent patriarchy in India, where men are seen as decision-makers. Unlike in the West, where working women often manage household duties, Indian families frequently employ domestic help. As homemakers do not generate income, they are often undervalued, though this is slowly changing. Educational videos showing women as homemakers reinforce that women's roles are limited to cooking and childcare.

Research by Lindsey Wotanis and Laurie McMillan highlights women's underrepresentation on YouTube. Since children are the future and education is critical, discriminatory content on educational platforms can hinder societal change. YouTube has the potential to bridge gender gaps in India, and stricter guidelines could



support achieving Goal 5 of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG).

Promoting digital literacy programs for women could significantly reduce the digital gender divide. Women should be educated about the benefits of mobile internet and how it can enhance their daily lives and provide income opportunities through content creation. Reducing the digital gender gap could change the educational content landscape, showcasing women as active content creators and professionals who positively influence the next generation.

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
